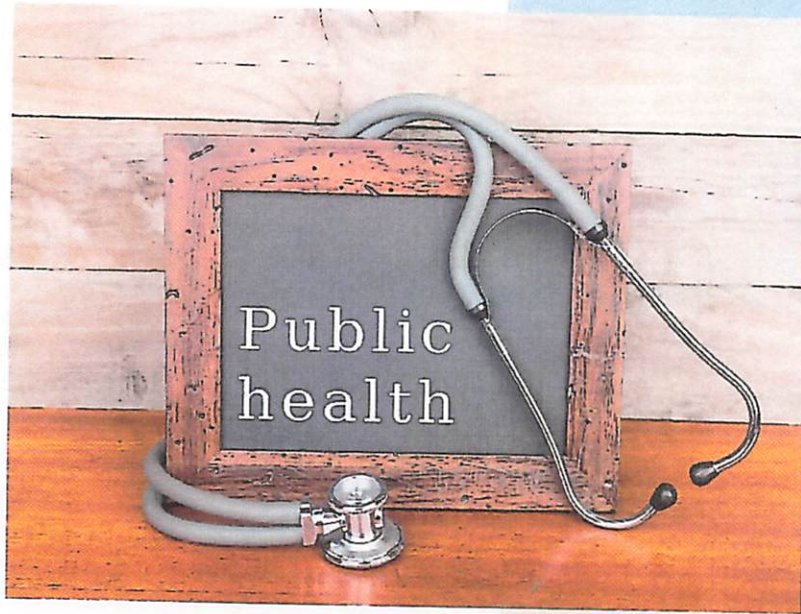

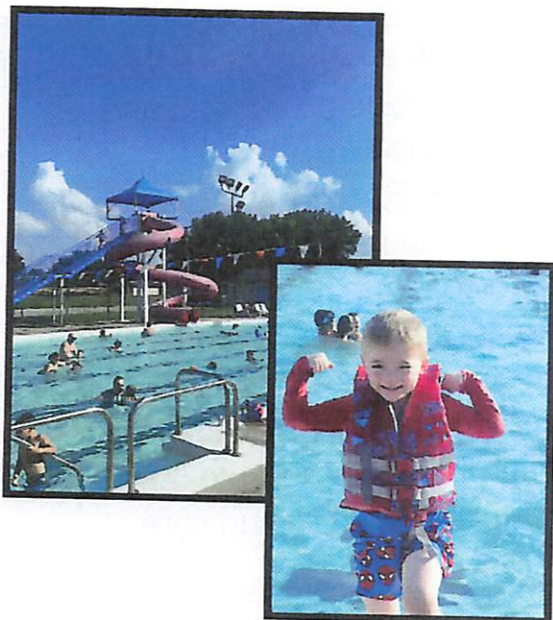

Rabies Clinic

Henry County Health Center would like to take this opportunity to thank Dave Hoagland, DVM from H & E Veterinary in Appleton City for giving of his time and effort during our annual rabies clinic. Thanks to Dave's support we were able to vaccinate 165 animals in Henry County. This service is one way that HCHC provides preventative services for our community.

The Henry County Health Center held a no-cost swim event in June for all members of the community. There were 140 in attendance at the Artesian Outdoor pool and community members responded with thanks for HCHC hosting this no-cost event. This was to promote activity and a healthy lifestyle alternative for individuals to get out and enjoy their community, as well as family and friends.

program SPOTLIGHT



C.Y.S.H.C.N.

During the reporting period, Lauren Bauer, Service Coordinator, supported a total of 54 children. Through the Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs (CYSHCN) program, Lauren facilitated approximately \$159,000 in funding for services and equipment to support eligible families. These funds provided essential items that significantly improved quality of life and accessibility for children with special health care needs. Notable items included: wheelchair ramps, SleepSafe beds, track lift systems, stairlift, Wonderfold wagon, special needs car seats, multiple wheelchair repairs, and additional adaptive equipment as needed

One impactful example includes a 4-year-old child in Stockton diagnosed with cerebral palsy. She had been undergoing intensive in-clinic physical rehabilitation to build strength and coordination. To continue this progress at home, CYSHCN provided funding for a PUMA harness system, enabling her to safely continue therapy outside the clinic setting.

This support played a crucial role in maintaining her developmental gains. The CYSHCN program continues to make a meaningful difference in the lives of children and families by increasing access to critical resources and care.

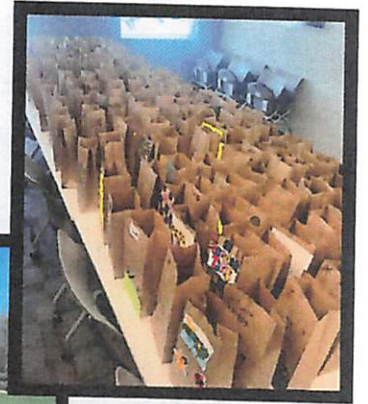
COMMUNITY SUPPORT

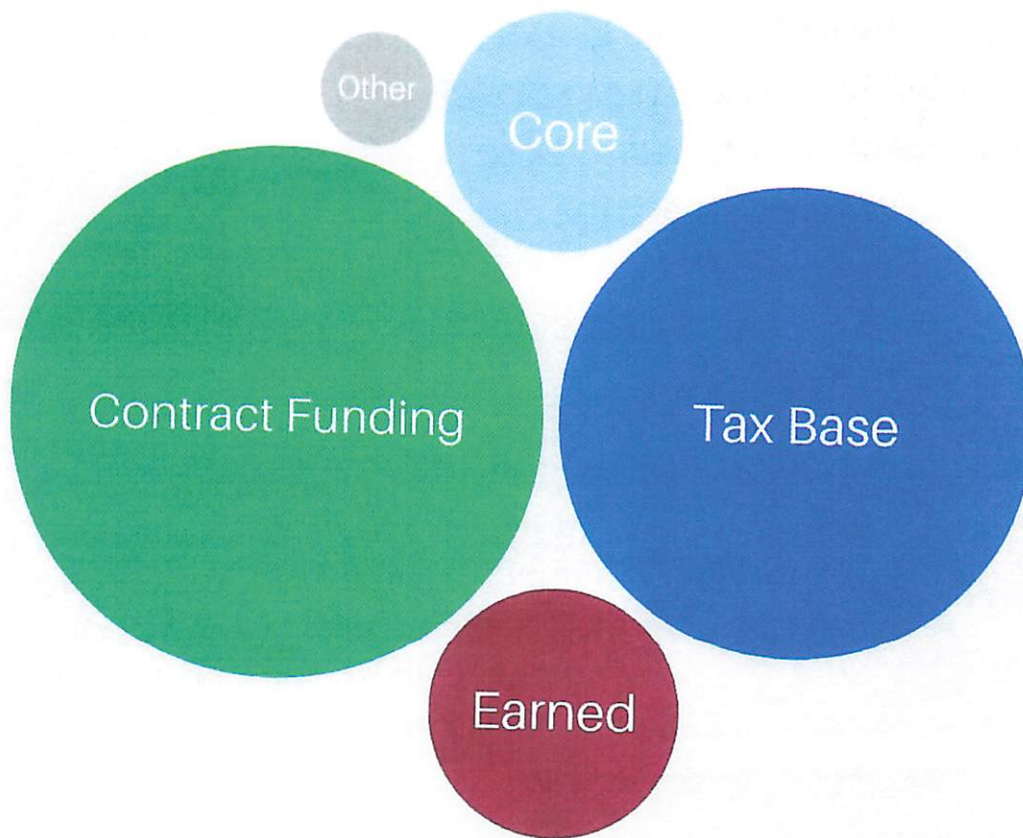

Contracts - 45%

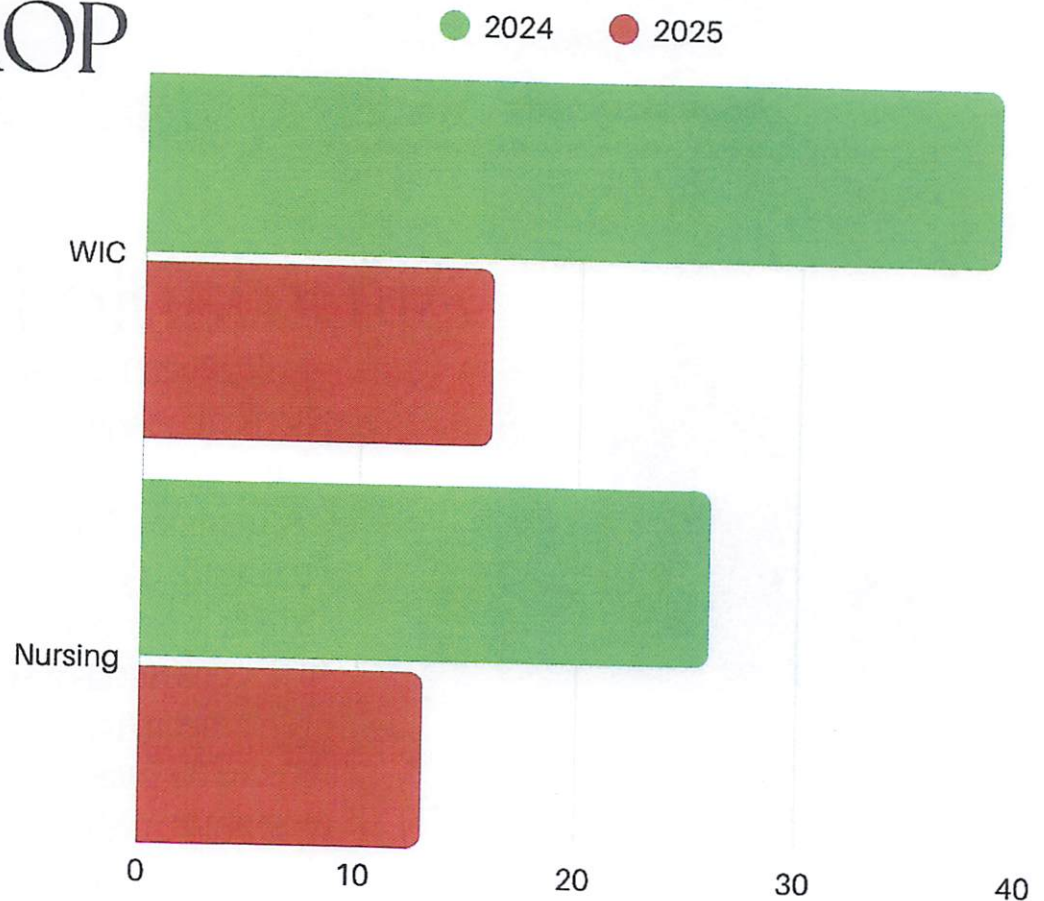
Tax Base - 35%

Affordable Lab Draws



In 2023 the HCHC Needs Assessment identified that some residents were not able to pay for their annual lab work and their medication at the same time. Often times these residents were limiting the use of their medication, i.e., insulin to be able to pay for the required annual lab work. In response to this need, HCHC contracted with a lab company that could run most labs that are needed for patient care. We then marketed this program to medical providers, through word-of-mouth and marketing campaign.

An example of the possible savings, one panel that will cost \$700 at other locations will cost \$150 at HCHC.
